Message of the President

Dear Ladies and Gentlemen,

The year 2020 was a unique time of crisis for the OWHC and for the whole world. The COVID-19 pandemic affected all countries around the globe and drastically changed everything: it stopped tourism and many other areas of the economy, depriving millions of people of their jobs and the very sense of their daily lives. It impacted culture, arts and creative industries, posing a threat to the development of local communities. Our member cities, which rely heavily on tourism for their economies, faced similar serious challenges.

As an international network, the lack of travel opportunities, meetings of experts and regional meetings were great disadvantages for the organization's work. We had to learn how to deal with the situation from the beginning without precedent. We had to create an organizational framework and technological tools that allowed us to maintain contact virtually, organize thematic conferences, workshops, and even celebrate important anniversaries for cities like Baku, Suzhou and Warsaw.

We developed a platform for sharing best practices in cultural management or in facilitating residents to live under pandemic restrictions. We continued our international meetings, sharing not only our problems, but also creative solutions for them. We were carrying out the Organization's projects and major programs, including the Jean-Paul-L'Allier Prize for Heritage, the "On the road to Quebec" Capacity Building Workshop and the International Video Production Competition. We were pleased to welcome Macao and Augsburg as new members of our organization.

The Board of Directors deliberated virtually, and the Regional Secretariats continued to work on projects that could be carried out online: webinars, art competitions and exhibitions. September 8, 2020 was a special Solidarity Day of World Heritage Cities, a time when the sense of solidarity resonated strongly within us, gaining special meaning. Perhaps that is why in 2020 the number of events in the cities was higher than usual. To the concern for the tangible and intangible heritage of our historic cities, which is the focus of our attention, we added a special sensitivity to the well-being of the people living in historic centers who have suddenly lost their jobs.

A few years ago at the regional conference in Denpasar, the conditions for resilient culture and tourism were discussed. Very soon - as early as in 2020 - it became clear that we had to develop tools to achieve such conditions. In this extraordinary situation, our Organization functioned efficiently and effectively. I am convinced that these extraordinary challenges and difficulties have made the OWHC stronger and more integrated, because openness, creativity and a sense of solidarity are particularly empowering.

In 2021, the OWHC celebrates a significant 30th Anniversary. Even though we will not hold the event until September 2022, during the World Congress in Quebec, we already have a feeling of satisfaction because over the years of cooperation, members of the network have built a valuable community of cities that enriches us all.


About the OWHC

New Cities of the OWHC

Augsburg (Germany)

Augsburg is situated on the northern tip of a glacial gravel deposit formed during the Ice Age that spreads between two Alpine rivers, the Lech and Wertach, as they converge at the mouth of a great drainage basin. This large aquifer formation produces purified groundwater that emerges in a series of springs that feed streams and water canals. The network of canals and watercourses represents an urban water landscape that includes the sources of both spring and river water.

Water and Augsburg's strategic location at the crossroads of important trade routes in south-central Germany were key foundations of the growth and prosperity of the city, its population, and its status as a flourishing trade metropolis.

New Cities of the OWHC

Macao (China)

Macao, a lucrative port of strategic importance in the development of international trade, was under Portuguese administration from the mid-16th century until 1999, when it came under Chinese sovereignty. With its historic street, residential, religious and public Portuguese and Chinese buildings, the historic centre of Macao provides a unique testimony to the meeting of aesthetic, cultural, architectural and technological influences from East and West. The site also contains a fortress and a lighthouse, the oldest in China. It bears witness to one of the earliest and longest-lasting encounters between China and the West, based on the vibrancy of international trade.

Special COVID-19 Campaign



In these difficult times, the OWHC continues to express its solidarity with all the leaders and the workers of our cities who make enormous efforts daily to protect all the citizens of their community.

One of the objectives of the OWHC is to encourage cooperation and the exchange of information between members, in addition to developing a sense of solidarity among them. City-to-City cooperation being crucial these days, the OWHC is committed to distributing in its network any useful information related to the pandemic.

In the first weeks after the outbreak of the crisis, the OWHC launched two social media campaigns. The #ResilientHeritageCities campaign focused on World Heritage cities affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, inviting members and their communities to share photos and videos of their deserted World Heritage cities and sites, as well as the heritage of past epidemics. The #HeritageCityStories campaign focused on the stories told by people with daily work related to urban World Heritage.

In addition, a call was made among members of the OWHC to identify and report on **exemplary initiatives** regarding crisis management and resilience in World Heritage cities. Many members responded positively to this campaign and sent their best practices which may be relevant and useful for other World Heritage cities.





Solidarity Day of World Heritage Cities (September 8)



Established in 1993, the Solidarity Day of World Heritage Cities is a unique opportunity to put heritage issues on the agenda and to express solidarity with World Heritage cities. With this celebration, we are shining the spotlight not only on the OWHC but also on the importance of being able to benefit from strong and present heritage cities.

As part of the Solidarity Day of World Heritage Cities, 2020 edition, particular emphasis was put on digital activities given the global pandemic of COVID-19 affecting us worldwide. Nevertheless, a record number of cities participated in the event this year.










Youth on the Trail of World Heritage (2019-2020 edition)



The Youth on the Trail of World Heritage program consists in pairing schools located in World Heritage cities and making it possible for groups of young people aged between 15 and 18 years old to get acquainted with the notion of World Heritage. Pairings allow students of different cities to virtually exchange their ideas, knowledge and work related to this subject. The students thus become aware of the universal value of their heritage and the challenges involved in the management of heritage on the international level.



Activities were also organized locally by teachers, such as a photo exhibition of heritage sites, guided tours, meetings with influential players in the city's heritage management, including the mayor of a participating city and even the Prime Minister of the country in one case!

Even if the second part of the program, the actual study trip, had to be cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the students did a great job in the first part with the virtual exchanges.







OWHC Grants City to City Cooperation



OWHC Grants is a program aiming to provide practical and financial assistance to the cities of the OWHC facing certain challenges or difficulties managing their World Heritage and to support member cities that wish to participate in a technical meeting to benefit from the knowledge and best practices of other member cities.

On 12-13 of February, the Administration of Icherisheher (Walled City of Baku) hosted a two-day training on Visitor Engagement and Storytelling, organized within the OWHC Grants program. The goal of the training was to improve the capacities of the museum and tourism services staff of Icherisheher regarding visitor engagement and storytelling. The training was provided by Mr. Matthias Ripp, OWHC Regional Coordinator for Northwest Europe and North America, whose expertise in this area, thanks to the World Heritage Visitor Center established and opened in 2011 in Regensburg (Germany), was greatly welcomed.

The training was designed to increase skills of the Icherisheher staff on the following three areas:

- Creative tourist routes to better communicate the value of Icherisheher to visitors
- 2. Visitor monitoring
- 3. Applying creative methods to promote less-visited attractions in addition to the key landmarks of the city







International Video Production Competition (2021 edition)



The OWHC launched the 6th Edition of the International Video Production Competition. This competition is intended for young people of two age groups: 14 and 17 years old and 18 and 21 years old. At the invitation of the cities that are part of the OWHC network and that have registered, the young people will be called upon to produce a video of a maximum duration of five minutes on a World Heritage City, and that will have to be published on the OWHC You Tube channel.

The theme for this edition: "New beginning. New vision. New city." In this particular pandemic context, we all have to take a different look at what surrounds us. This situation offers a golden opportunity for a new beginning, for a new way of seeing and appreciating our World Heritage. For this edition, young people are invited to reflect on the changes taking place in their city, but also on the opportunities that these changes may bring.

Jean-Paul-L'Allier Prize for Heritage (2021 edition)



Every two years, the Jean-Paul-L'Allier Prize for Heritage is awarded by the OWHC to one of its member cities in good standing. The award highlights a project, a program or a policy related to the conservation, enhancement or good management of a living urban ensemble or property within an urban context thanks, in part, to the commitment of its local communities. The urban ensemble or property must be located within the territory of an OWHC member city inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List.

Launched in 2020, this edition introduces several new features,

including a brand new visual identity and new rewards for the winning city. OWHC members can also vote for their favorite project among the finalists. This project will receive an honorable mention.

The winning city and the members' choice will be revealed at a special ceremony organized as part of the 2021 OWHC General Assembly.



Virtual Puzzles of World Heritage Cities



The Regional Secretariat for Southern Europe and the Mediterranean created some entertaining virtual puzzles with photographs taken in cities of that region. This excellent promotional tool is also an original way to discover World Heritage Cities from home.





Webinar "Quality of Life in Historic Centers"



The Regional Secretariat for Southern Europe and the Mediterranean organized on Friday 26 June 2020 a training webinar on the theme "Quality of life in historic centers".

Two speakers were invited: Prof. Martha Thorne, Dean of the IE Business School of Architecture and Design, and Prof. Jordi Tres Serras, Consultant for UNESCO, Vice-President of ICOMOS Spain and President of Ibertur.





OWHC Young Travelling - Exhibition in Regensburg




For the second time already, the Regional Secretariat for Northwest Europe and North America has awarded a "Young Travelling Scholarship" in summer 2019, i.e. a scholarship for travel enthusiasts between the ages of 18 and 28. The travel scholarship, which is endowed with 1000 euros, enables young people to get to know World Heritage Cities in Europe and North America and to understand why UNESCO World Heritage is so particularly worthy of protection for all of us.

Seven winning teams were selected from over 70 international applications. From July to October 2019, the Young Travellers were on the road and reported on their World Heritage experiences on their own travel blog and various social media channels.



Webinar "Using Urban Heritage to Improve the Quality of Life"

"ENHANCING LIVABILITY IN WORLD HERITAGE CITIES - USING URBAN HERITAGE TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE"



The OWHC Regional Secretariat for Northwest Europe and North America, together with the host city Luxembourg, held a virtual meeting with Webinar on the topic of "Livability in World Heritage Cities - Using Urban Heritage to Improve the Quality of Life" on September 24th 2020. With an introductory presentation by Professor Christer Gustafsson from Uppsala University in Sweden and an expert in Heritage Conservation, the defining categories for the "livability" were tackled. Graded by an interactive poll for all participants, the most relevant of the five categories were discussed and rated.





A Youthful Vision-Drawing Contest



The drawing contest has been organised by the Municipality of Banská Štiavnica since 1995 and is for children from the World Heritage cities. The drawing contest is inspired by the inscription of the Historic Town of Banská Štiavnica and the Technical Monuments in its Vicinity to the UNESCO World Heritage List in 1993. Every year we received an average of 2000 works from all over the world. The jury awards 3 best works in each category as well as certificates of honour. Awarded works exhibition opening

takes place in June in Banská Štiavnica, later the exhibition is hosted by other World Heritage cities, such as Budapest in 2016 and 2017 or Luxemburg in 2018.

For this 26th edition in 2020, the organizers received as many as 397 entries from more than 20 schools in 13 World Heritage Cities of 9 countries (Czech Republic, Brasil, Azerbaijan, Latvia, Morocco, Russian Federation, France and Slovakia).




Special Webinar COVID-19 and Regional Meeting



On September 28, a webinar was held on the occasion of the 40th anniversary of the inscription of the Historic Center of Warsaw on the UNESCO World Heritage List. The webinar was combined with a regional meeting.

The cities of the region were invited to present their own topics, issues or problems that they were currently facing. The aim of the webinar was to exchange knowledge, experience and mutual support in the difficult time of struggling with the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.





5th Experts' Workshop of OWHC-AP



Despite the vaccinations campaigns that were underway in several countries by the end of 2020, many challenges were awaiting cities and tourist offices. With budget cuts, bankruptcies of small businesses and health measures still in place, how can cities revive tourism in 2021?

The Experts' workshop, hosted by the Asia-Pacific Regional Secretariat, addressed this issue.





Asia-Pacific World Heritage Cities Photo Contest

OWHC-AP - OWHC's Regional Secretariat for Asia-Pacific - called for the harmonious coexistence of people and World Heritage. The OWHC-AP World Heritage Cities Photo Contest invited participants to take photos of people living with UNESCO World Heritage or capture moments of everyday life in World Heritage cities in the Asia-Pacific region.



The theme of this edition was "The Moment of New-Normal Life in World Heritage Cities". OWHC-AP would like to express its deepest gratitude to each participant for answering the call and showing their interest in World Heritage cities and life within them.


Nineteen participants were awarded in the categories Gold, Silver, Bronze and special mentions.



Content Creators Program



The objectives of the Asia-Pacific region's Content Creators program are to create a young and vibrant image of the organization to increase awareness of heritage and build a network to promote youth participation within the framework of the OWHC. One of the activities is to create online content for the various platforms of the Asia-Pacific Regional Secretariat, including Facebook and Instagram. The content developed is also used in the other activities of the Secretariat, in particular the HeCiTag Magazine.





Webinar "Management, Technologies and Sustainable Tourism" and Regional Meeting



As part of the commemorations of the 37th anniversary of the declaration of Cusco as cultural heritage of humanity given by UNESCO, the provincial municipality of Cusco organized the regional meeting of the Regional Secretariat of South America of the OWHC as well as the webinar "Management, Technologies and Sustainable Tourism in Times of Pandemic".

The meeting held between December 9 and 11, 2020, provided the opportunity to listen to lectures by Dr. Jordi Tresserras and architect Verónica Heras Barros. Discussion

groups with the participants then allowed the reflections to be deepened. The event was organized jointly with the General Directorate of International Relations and Cooperation of Cuenca (Ecuador).

On the last day, a working table with the member cities of the region made it possible to confirm the merger between the regions of South America and Central America, the Caribbean and Mexico.



"Guardianes del patrimonio" Program



The main objective of the "Guardianes del patrimonio" program (Guardians of Heritage) is to involve the citizens who live in World Heritage cities in the appropriation of this heritage for its appreciation and promotion. This program aims to bring together and train volunteer citizens in "preventive maintenance", to ensure the cleaning and maintenance of historic sites in their cities and to encourage preservation, participation and social responsibility with regards to heritage issues.

This program, launched in June 2019 in the city of Morelia, continued in 2020 to carry out activities on a periodic basis, when measures allowed it. The aim is to replicate this program in all World Heritage cities belonging to the Regional Secretariat.



Jean-Paul-L'Allier Libraries



The project's overall objective is to focus on conveying the legacy of Jean-Paul L'Allier, founder of the Organization of World Heritage Cities, to future generations.

In 2020, the Clavijero Cultural Center, located in Morelia, collaborated with the city to create a space for a Jean-Paul-L'Allier library, in its magnificent Vargas Lugo library.

Moreover, as a result of the strategic alliance with the Regional Secretariat for Central America, the Caribbean and Mexico, the city of Puebla, through the management of the historic center, consolidated the reading room of the Casa de Puente de Bubas as the new Jean-Paul L'Allier library.

These two spaces dedicated to the dissemination of local heritage have therefore been added to the network of libraries.

These libraries offer, in addition to the consultation of books, documents, and other material related to heritage, many activities aimed at strengthening the sense of belonging and interest of citizens in the heritage of the city.



General Assemblies 2020 and Thematic Conferences



Two general assemblies were held in 2020 by the OWHC's Regional Secretariat for Central America, the Caribbean and Mexico. These meetings made it possible to establish the objectives of the region and to plan the programs and activities for the coming year.

The first meeting was held on May 28, 2020. Because of the global situation due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the meeting was organized virtually, with the support of the city of San Pablo Villa de Mitla. 21 representatives attended the general assembly.


The second general assembly was held on December 14, 2020. The virtual meeting, organized with the support of the city of Querétaro, was inaugurated by the Secretary General of the OWHC. Regional coordinators from Southern Europe and the Mediterranean as well as South America were present for the occasion. The meeting also welcomed the cities of Guanajuato and Cartegena de Indias as new member cities in the region.

Communications

At the end of 2019, the OVPM took steps to put in place a digital strategy aimed at refocusing its use of social media. The strategy was fully implemented in 2020 and is now in effect.


